The 2023 Council Elections are done and dusted with myself, Cr Burke Maslen and Cr Luke Vandeleur being returned. We also welcome former Councillor Cr Dudley Maslen along with first time Councillor Cr Paul Kelly.

I sincerely thank those in our community that made the effort to vote and all candidates for their participation. The past four years has seen a significant positive change in our Council with Andrea Selvey (CEO) commencing work who facilitated much of that change supported by a Council committed to providing our community with proper and due governance.

RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN REFERENCE GROUP MEMBERS APPOINTED

In July 2022, Council endorsed the Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) for the Shire of Carnarvon. A key action of the RAP is to establish and maintain an effective reference group to inform and guide the implementation of the RAP.

In April 2023, Council endorsed the RAP Reference Group Terms of Reference which provided the framework for the Shire to call for expressions of interest for this Reference Group from the community.

The RAP Reference Group aims to provide the Shire with strategic advice on the views, needs, and interests of Aboriginal People in the Carnarvon and Coral Bay region.

The RAP Reference Group will inform and monitor the Shire of Carnarvon's Reconciliation Action Plan implementation through collaboration, communication, and positive relationships.

The objectives of the RAP Reference Group are to:

- Develop and maintain strong relationships between the Shire and the Aboriginal community of Carnarvon.
- Provide feedback and comment in relation to the Shire of Carnarvon's Reconciliation Action Plan.
- Assist with and monitor the progress of the Shire of Carnarvon's Reconciliation Action Plan deliverables.
- Provide input into reviewing, evaluating, and developing future Reconciliation Action Plans developed by the Shire of Carnarvon.
- Inform and advise the community of actions that have occurred as a direct result of the Reconciliation Action Plan.
- Raise awareness and advocate for improved access to Shire services by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, cultural relevance, and appropriateness of all Shire services, policies, and programs.
- Facilitate access to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander residents, businesses, stakeholders, and community leaders.
- Assist in identifying and removing barriers to equal participation for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and community.
- Advocate for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community, promoting recognition of contribution to the community.

Following Council's endorsement of the Terms of Reference for the RAP Reference Group, the Shire advertised for members through various channels such as social media, the website, and targeted emails to stakeholders within the community which resulted in four applications for membership to this Reference Group. The Shire, via the Councilendorsed RAP, has made a commitment to the journey towards reconciliation by focusing on learning, promoting, and celebrating the world's oldest continuing culture and building our cultural competency. The RAP Reference Group will support the Shire to continue to develop an understanding and connections with the region's Aboriginal people.

The Yinggarda Aboriginal Corporation (YAC) and Nganhurra Thanardu, Garrbu Aboriginal Corporation (NTGAC) as the Prescribed Body Corporate within the Shire of Carnarvon, have a permanent seat on the Reference Group. We are delighted that Kath Ryan (YAC) and Karla Tittums (NTGAC) will be the representatives from the two Prescribed Body Corporates.

The applicants presented and recommended to Council will provide the Shire with valuable insight and connection to the Aboriginal community and will play an instrumental role in fostering a sense of belonging and unity. Congratulations to those members who were endorsed and include -

REMAINDER OF 2023/2024 ROADS TO RECOVERY FUNDS TO BE ALLOCATED TOWARDS EXISTING ROBINSON STREET RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT

The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications (Department) supports maintenance and improvement of local road infrastructure assets via the Roads to Recovery (R2R) Program.

unallocated R2R funding was retained as a contingency for the Robinson Street reconstruction project.As these works are now largely completed, and the contingency was not required, the unallocated balance of the R2R funding needs to be assigned to a project(s).

Initial planning and design work commenced on the main street reconstruction project in May 2022.Total project expenditure to date has now been reviewed. It has been established that if the unallocated R2R funding is now allocated to the Robinson Street reconstruction project, that will remove the requirement for the Shire contribution of \$118,000. Approximately \$103,000 of Shire funding will effectively be available to be reallocated elsewhere within the budget or placed into reserve.

This action will also mean that the Shire's R2R program is completely expended and completed.

During this R2R review, five projects were also considered as possible projects for the unallocated funds. These projects may assist Council during midyear budget review deliberations when considering allocation of the recommended budget saving.

On balance, allocation of the unallocated R2R funding to the Robinson Street Reconstruction Project was supported by Council for the following reasons:

a) It fully and successfully acquits the Shire's R2R program with the full allocation being spent within the required timeframe. (This is the final year of the current five-year R2R program; and

b) No additional project is required to be completed between now and 30 June 2024 to complete the R2R program; and

c) It provides Council with a saving in its 23/24 budget of approximately \$103,000 that can be allocated to other projects or placed into reserve funds.

AMNESTY ON TIP FEES FOR COMMERCIAL PROPERTIES

The recent amnesty on tip fees to encourage horticultural property owners/operators to remove waste from their properties and dispose of free of charge at the landfill site is considered to have been successful in reducing waste stockpiled in and around these properties and adjacent to the river and its waterways.

MKB has put forward a request for a similar amnesty to be extended to commercial properties. The request states –

"There are a lot of properties that require urgent attention and require a clean-up of miscellaneous waste surrounding their properties. The incentive may entice landowners to clean up the outer pars of the commercial precinct of Carnarvon."

An amnesty arrangement is intended to encourage disposal of waste from a property cleanup. That cleanup may not necessarily have occurred without the offer of a fee amnesty so it is not possible to reasonably estimate any potential loss in waste disposal fees. The horticultural waste amnesty resulted in approximately \$50,000 worth of waste being disposed of at the waste facility.

The request for a commercial property amnesty has merit to encourage those property owners to tidy up any stockpiled waste removing possible fire hazards, reducing havens for vermin, and providing improved visual community amenity.

Approximately 170 properties were eligible to participate in the horticultural property amnesty. A three-month amnesty period was considered by Council to be appropriate for those properties due to the amnesty occurring during a busy time of year for that sector i.e. planting and harvesting and the larger property sizes.

It should also be noted that to provide a more rigorous and quantified assessment of the scale and nature of the problem in the horticultural area, DWER funded a Waste Audit in late August 2021. No such audit has been completed for the Commercial/Industrial rated properties. Observationally however, many such properties are in an untidy state.

An amnesty to Commercial/Industrial rated properties would be applicable to approximately 200 Carnarvon properties. Those properties are likely to be smaller in area than those in the horticultural areas.

Given the lack of an actual audit and the smaller land area, a shorter amnesty period is therefore considered appropriate. A one-month period was proposed and endorsed by Council.

TYRE DISPOSAL FEES AND CHARGES AMENDED

In July 2023, Council adopted its 2023/24 schedule of fees and charges. Those Fees and Charges came into effect on 25 September 2023.

That fee schedule included significant revision of charges applicable at the Browns Range Waste Facility. Council also undertook to review these waste disposal fees six months after their implementation due to the extensive nature of the changes.

Fees applicable for the disposal of tyres were amended to a single \$2/kg disposal fee for both domestic and commercial customers with the intention of that being more equitable and a simple fee to administer. Prior to that, the fee applicable was according to tyre type.

The weight range of the various tyre types make it difficult to arrive at a per kg fee that would replicate the fee charged by tyre type. Consequently, fees for disposal of larger tyre types (truck tyres, tractor tyres etc) have been found to be significantly higher than the previous fee by type.

Two written requests to review the per kg fee have been received due to the high cost of disposal when based upon the \$2/kg fee. Facility operators have also reported other informal customer complaints regarding the per kg fee. The Shire promptly responded to complaints and reviewed the fee structure. It was found that practical implementation of a per kg fee has proven difficult. This is particularly so for small or single quantities of tyres. The waste facility weighbridge simply does not have the resolution necessary to accurately weigh smaller individual tyres.

To weigh those smaller quantities requires purchase of another smaller set of approved scales. To comply with relevant national trade measurement laws, that scale must be calibrated to ensure correct weights are charged to customers. The facility weighbridge is calibrated annually for that reason. An average estimated or typical weight charge is also contrary to the trade measurement laws if charging customers by the kilogram.

These issues and risks can be eliminated by reintroduction of a fee by tyre type. Although adding some complexity back into the fee structure, it is considered an appropriate trade-off to both restore safe and efficient operations and disposal pricing consistent with a CPI increase on the 2022/23 fees.

Council endorsed the amendment with the new fees and charges for tyres effective from 25 September 2023, demonstrating their commitment to listening to the community.







SHIRE OF CARNARVON RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN REFERENCE GROUP APPOINTED

At the Council meeting on 24 October, Council received nominations for the Shire of Carnarvon Reconciliation Action Plan Reference Group.

Council acknowledged all applicants and appointed highly respected community leaders who applied to be members of the community representatives. These representatives will work alongside Kath Ryan as Yinggarda Aboriginal Corporation representative, and Karla Tittums as Nganhurra Thanardi Garrbu Aboriginal Corporation representative, the successful applicants for the Reference Group are Carleen Ryder, Rennee Turner, and Paige Ryan.

In making these appointments by a unanimous support, Council reiterated its unwavering dedication and commitment to advancing reconciliation and strengthening the relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous Australians and to promoting meaningful change, respect, and recognition for our Aboriginal communities.

As an organisation, the Shire of Carnarvon recognises that historic and more recent events have had a significant impact on many people in our community which has the potential to create an environment of division and undermine unity.

Shire President, Eddie Smith stated, "In this environment where unity is needed more than ever, the Reconciliation process, informed by our Reconciliation Action Plan and led by our Reference Group is vitally important. The Shire of Carnarvon has shown leadership and has demonstrated to the rest of Australia that we are committed to fostering a community that is committed to mutual respect, reconciliation, and inclusivity."

The Shire of Carnarvon looks forward to working with the Committee to achieve our shared goal of reconciliation and strengthening the bonds between all members of our community.



GOLDEN CROWNBEARD - WEED

Please be advised it has been discovered that several instances of the Golden Crownbeard Weed has been identified in and around Carnarvon.

This is an aggressive weed that displaces native vegetation and is toxic to stock and other animals.

We are currently in peak flowering and seeding season. So it is important to stop any further spread of this weed.

The Shire is currently actively removing the Golden Crownbeard from known public property.

As a community, we need your help, to work together to keep our biodiversity and nature-scapes, pest free.

We need your help!

If this weed is found on your property please see the below best practices to help stop the spread throughout our community.







Best Practice:

Pull weed from ground ensuring its roots are intact and removed from the soil.

Collect weed, roots and seeds in a garbage bag and ensure that its fully sealed. It can either be disposed in general waste or, we also encourage drying and burning the weed in a small personal fire.

Breast cancer is the most diagnosed cancer amongst women in Australia. Approximately 57 Australians are diagnosed every day. That's over 20,000 Australians diagnosed with breast cancer each year.

1 in 7 women are diagnosed with breast cancer in their lifetime. About 1 in 500 men are diagnosed in their lifetime. Around 1,000 young women are diagnosed with breast cancer annually, equivalent to about 3 young women a day. In 2023, over 3,200 Australians will pass away from breast cancer (including 30-40 males). One woman under 40 is expected to die each week from breast cancer.

That's 9 Australians a day dying from the disease.

This October for Breast Cancer Awareness Month the Shire of Carnarvon has lit the Civic Centre in pink to raise awareness of this deadly disease. Early detection of breast cancer gives the best possible chance of survival. 

OFF-ROAD VEHICLE CONTROL

Pursuant the Control of Vehicles (Off Road Areas) Act 1978 it is an offence to drive or ride an off-road vehicle within the Shire of Carnarvon, unless it is an approved gazetted area or used on private land with the owner's consent.

Off-road vehicles include trail bikes, two and four wheeled motor bikes, go-carts and buggies.

The Shire of Carnarvon and the WA Police take the riding/driving of off-road vehicles in non-permitted areas seriously and may seize the vehicle, prosecute or issue infringements.

All off-road vehicles used in areas covered by the Act, other than on private land with consent of the owner, must be registered through the <u>Department of Transport off road licensing</u>.

PENALTIES

Council Rangers, WA Police and other authorised officers can issue infringement notices. Offenders who use off-road vehicle vehicles in non-permitted areas could have their vehicle seized and impounded for up to 12 months and face a \$1000 fine

Offence	Penalty	Maximum
Drive/ride an off-road vehicle in a non-permitted area	\$50	\$500
Any motor vehicle (other than road registered) must be off-road registered	\$50	\$500
Failure to wear a protective helmet	\$50	\$800

There are limitations to where road-registered vehicles including four-wheel-drives and road/trail bikes are taken. Drainage reserves, levy banks and parks are strictly off-limits. Contact Ranger Services on (08) 9941 0019 or Customer Service (08) 9941 0000 for further information.

REPORT ILLEGAL OFF-ROAD VEHICLE USE

Off-road vehicle use is only permitted on private property with consent or in a permitted area within the Shire of Carnarvon.

If you see someone in an area not permitted please contact the appropriate authority with as much information as possible, including:

- Registration details
- Description of the motorbike or vehicle and
- Day, time and location.



ART WITH THE STARS EXHIBITION OPENS IN CARNARVON

The first *Art with the Stars* exhibition launched in Carnarvon on 13 October 2023, showcasing artwork produced by Shooting Stars participants from schools across WA as they learn from local Aboriginal artists and connect to culture through art.

Shooting Stars is an education and empowerment program for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander girls in Western and South Australia. Based in 22 schools, Shooting Stars is predominantly staffed by Aboriginal women (85%) and reaches over 1,200 girls and young women.

Art with the Stars is a project run within the Shooting Stars program, which brings program participants together with a local Aboriginal artist for 10 weeks as the girls connect to culture through art-making. To date, there have been eight *Art with the Stars* projects across six different Shooting Stars sites.

From the 14 October to 25 November, the Carnarvon community is invited to see the first *Art with the Stars* exhibition, which is exhibited at the Shire of Carnarvon Library and Art Gallery. Visitors to the gallery will experience powerful stories shared by the young artists through their work. The range of projects covers various media including basket-weaving, textiles, painting, fashion, and dance, showcasing the diversity and strength of art-making and culture across Western Australia.

The artists who mentored the Shooting Stars participants include Vicki and Kathy Long in Halls Creek; Bonni Ingram and Esma McMahon in Carnarvon; Bianca Hart in Collie; Honey Webb at the Kiara College site; Rodelle Battle and Rebecca Councillor in Mullewa; and in Fitzroy Crossing, designers Lois Hazel and Simone Agius in conjunction with local artists Ivy Nargoodah, Torrence Lulu and Natalie Davy.

The Art with the Stars project and the Carnarvon exhibition is supported by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, Lotterywest, the Australian Government in partnership with the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal, UnLtd, the Shire of Carnarvon.

Dark Sky Tourism Update

The Gascoyne Development Commission (GDC) is committed to supporting the development of Dark Sky Tourism in the Gascoyne.

Our region's rich Aboriginal cultural history, minimal light pollution and existing astronomical assets make for an excellent opportunity for growing Dark Sky Tourism in the Gascoyne. To facilitate the development of this niche tourism market and build on the success of the 2023 Total Solar Eclipse, we have initiated a new project 'Gazing the Gascoyne'.

Using a place-based approach to economic development, the GDC will support each local government to progress their own Dark Sky Tourism priorities for the 2023/24 year. We have also formed a working group with the four local Shires in our region to work collaboratively to develop a Dark Sky Tourism product which will link each of the four local governments and further consolidate the region as a dark sky tourism destination.

Carnarvon Heritage Precinct Revitalisation Update

The Carnarvon Heritage Group (CHG) have commenced revitalisation work in the Carnarvon Heritage Precinct utilising \$200,000 funding provided by the GDC and announced earlier in the year by the Minister for Regional Development, the Hon. Don Punch MLA.

The first project, reconditioning of the old light house head in the grounds of the lighthouse keeper's cottage, is almost complete. Interpretive signage using the historic One Mile Jetty timber will acknowledge the history of the lighthouse and pay tribute to the early local families involved.

Work has also commenced on the review of the Heritage Precinct masterplan. CHG have appointed H & H Architects to undertake the review process. This process is likely to take 6 months and include comprehensive stakeholder engagement to ensure that the aspirations and priorities of the community are reflected in the updated masterplan which will celebrate the Jetty's history and significance to Carnarvon and Western Australia.

The GDC are committed to continue supporting the CHG as they work towards completing the Heritage revitalisation project and we acknowledge the support of the Shire of Carnarvon who have contributed \$10,000 to the masterplan review.

CARNARVON ABORIGINAL COMMUNITY TUBERCULOSIS (TB) SCREENING PROGRAM

WA Country Health Service (WACHS), in collaboration with WA Tuberculosis (TB) Control Program (WATBCP), is providing six weeks of free community screening for TB for Aboriginal people in Carnarvon, Mungullah and Burringurrah community from 30 October - 8 December 2023.

TB is an infectious disease that can damage the lungs and other parts of the body, causing serious illness and sometimes death when left untreated.

Symptoms of TB can range from a cough lasting more than two weeks, fatigue, loss of appetite, fevers and night sweats, while some people can experience no symptoms (asymptomatic) – making it all more important to get tested, as Aboriginal health matters the most.

If TB is left active and undetected in the community, it can spread through coughs or sneezes.

Latent TB, sometimes known as sleeping TB, is when a person has a TB infection, but their body is able to fight the bacteria and keep symptoms and the spread of the disease at bay.

TB screening involves a simple blood test, which can be offered in privacy and if the test is positive, healthcare staff can provide preventative treatment before the disease causes any health problems.

TB or not TB?

Carnarvon Aboriginal Community **Tuberculosis (TB) Screening Program**

What is TB?

TB is an infectious disease that can make people very sick, sometimes people can carry the bacteria that causes TB without knowing and it doesn't make them sick straight away.

How do you get TB?

TB is usually spread by breathing in the bacteria after someone who has untreated TB disease in their lungs coughs or sneezes.

Why community screening is needed?

Carnarvon has had a few cases of TB over the past few years. The screening program will help find out if there are any more cases of TB in the Aboriginal community and help people get treatment before they get sick. The more people get tested, the better for our community because it helps us look after each other's health.

What does TB Screening involve?

A simple blood test can show if a person has been exposed to TB and they can be offered preventive treatment before it makes them sick.

Who is it for?

Aboriginal residents living in Carnarvon and Mungullah community.

When and where?

Screening will commence on 30th October 2023 and will go for six weeks at various locations in Carnarvon and Mungullah. Screening will be offered at GRAMS-Gascoyne Outreach Service on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Keep an eye on screening locations and information stalls organised by Midwest Public Health team.

Screening is also available at Pathwest Carnarvon Hospital, through your local GP or call 0427 085 402 to discuss other options.






