MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT - BE A VOCAL LOCAL AND GET OUT AND VOTE!

A VERY BIG THANK YOU TO COUNCILLORS' KANE SIMPSON, JULEE NELSON, KRISTAN PINNER & LUKE SKENDER

At the September Council Meeting it was announced that it would be Cr Simpson's, Cr Nelson's and Cr Pinner's last Council Meeting. Cr Luke Skender was also acknowledged as it may also be his last Council Meeting however this will depend on the upcoming elections on 16 October 2021 for which he has renominated.

President Smith acknowledged their contribution to Council and thanked them all for their commitment and dedication and wished them well in their future endeavours.

DEAN CONTRACTING PTY LTD AWARDED TENDER FOR FLOOD DAMAGE REPAIRS PACKAGES ONE AND TWO

The Shire suffered damage to various road assets from the TL12U weather event in February this year. The reinstatement cost for repair of these roads qualifies for Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements – Western Australia (DRFA-WA) funding to repair damage to pre-weather event condition.

In April 2021, Council resolved to appoint Greenfield Technical Services for the following services associated with the events recovery works:

- Professional engineering services for the development of contract specifications and tender submission assessments;
- Onsite engineering supervision, documentation and certification of contract remediation works; and
- Administrative support for lodgement of reimbursement claims to the Department of Fire & Emergency Services (DFES) under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements Western Australia (DRFAWA).

A tender was prepared inviting suitably experienced and qualified contractors to quote on completing flood damage reinstatement works contained in two works packages of approximately equal value. Package 1 includes the northern roads affected. Package 2 consists of the southern and eastern roads affected. Both packages include separately funded improvement works.

CARNARVON RIFLE CLUB'S REQUEST TO WAIVER TIP FEES REFUSED BY COUNCIL

The Carnarvon Rifle Club have written to the Shire requesting the waiver of a tip fee for disposal of rubbish from a shooting event held annually at their shared facilities with the Carnarvon Pistol Club.

Sporting clubs provide a valuable element to community life. Waste management and disposal is also however a part of community life and there is a cost associated with provision of that service. Fees and charges applied consistently across the community ensures users of the service contribute to its ongoing operation.

Council were of the view that while it is understandable that the Rifle Club would wish to keep their expenses to a minimum for this event a total cost of \$40.00 for the disposal of four bins at the landfill site does not seem an excessive expense for the Club to manage. A small tariff applied to visiting shooters could negate this expense.

BLOWHOLES ROAD WIDENING TENDER RE-ADVERTISED AND CONTRACT AWARDED

In June 2021 RFT 03/2021 was advertised to complete 18km of road widening and sealed edge repair works along Blowholes Road. Council resolved to re-tender for the works under RFT 05/2021. Council has approved the submission from RJ Haulage Pty Ltd, trading as Safe Roads WA, to complete these works.

The project is funded under Regional Roads Group (RRG) project funding with a total approved budget of \$375,000. The Shire contribution consists of one third, namely \$125,000 with the remainder of funds provided by MRWA. Based upon the recommended submission pricing, total estimated cost to complete widening and edge repair of Blowholes Road is \$503,200. i.e. a budget shortfall of \$128,200.

The existing available budget will allow completion of approximately 13.5 of the 18km remainder of the road that requires widening and edge repair. That remaining 4.5km would need to be completed with another mobilisation in 2022/23 if not completed now. This is not preferable as it delivers lower value for money given the mobilisation/demobilisation cost of approximately \$25,000.

Blowholes Road is a significant local road and a popular tourist route to the Quobba coastal attractions. Completion of the remaining 18km of road works will result in widening the entire length of Blowholes Road to a minimum of 7m with the sealed edges repaired. Provisional items were included in the specification for the sealing of four vehicle pull over rest sites to improve traveller comfort and provide safe areas to stop without obstructing the roadway. The tender was awarded to RJ Haulage Pty Ltd and a budget variation approved by Council to redirect funding from the Quobba/Gnaraloo road to the Blowholes Road to enable finalisation of the road widening works.

REGIONAL ROAD GROUP FUNDING ALLOCATIONS FOR 2022/2023 DETERMINED

In previous years the Corporate Business Plan (CBP) identified the Capital Works Program for Road Construction. The 2020/21 financial year is the fourth and final year of the current CBP. RRG Road Project Grants funding provides 2/3 of a total project allocation with Council contributing 1/3 towards the total project cost.

The recommended work program has been based upon the following three priorities:

1. Resealing works on Carnarvon Mullewa Road
2. Reconstruction and resheeting works on Quobba Gnaraloo Road and
3. Resheeting and culvert installation of Minilya Lyndon Road

Resealing works on the Carnarvon Mullewa Road is the highest priority as the seal ages in the sections to be resealed averages around 14.5 years. Resealing will typically occur every 12-15 years.

The indicative budget has been allocated in accordance with resealing works required to be completed in 22/23. The balance has been split evenly between the other two roads.

Council has agreed to the following proposed projects for the RRG Funding in 2022/2023 with the final budget allocations to be determined in the 2022/2023 budget process -

CARNARVON SPEEDWAY TO RECEIVE SUPPORT FROM COUNCIL FOR CLUB NIGHT LIGHTS PROGRAM

A funding application has been prepared by Carnarvon Speedway Club and sought a formal letter of Council support for their project. The purpose of the application is to upgrade the lighting systems identified by Carnarvon Speedway and their governing body to provide safer facilities, for competitors, volunteers and spectators. By improving their lighting facilities, the Carnarvon Speedway Club will meet the selection criteria when applying to host State and National series.

The grant application is required to be reviewed, assessed and endorsed by the Local Government Authority prior to being submitted to the Department of Local Government, Sport & Cultural Industries.

In reviewing the application, Council were satisfied that the application for the Carnarvon Speedway is satisfactory and meets the community and strategic outcomes of the Shire of Carnarvon and accordingly provided a formal letter of support for their funding application.

OFFICERS APPOINTED UNDER THE BUSH FIRES ACT

The Bush Fires Act 1954 (the Act) has several statutory requirements relevant to local government. Section 38 of the Bush Fires Act 1954 gives local government the power to appoint Bush Fire Control Officers and the Act provides such persons with the necessary authority to perform their duties under the Act.

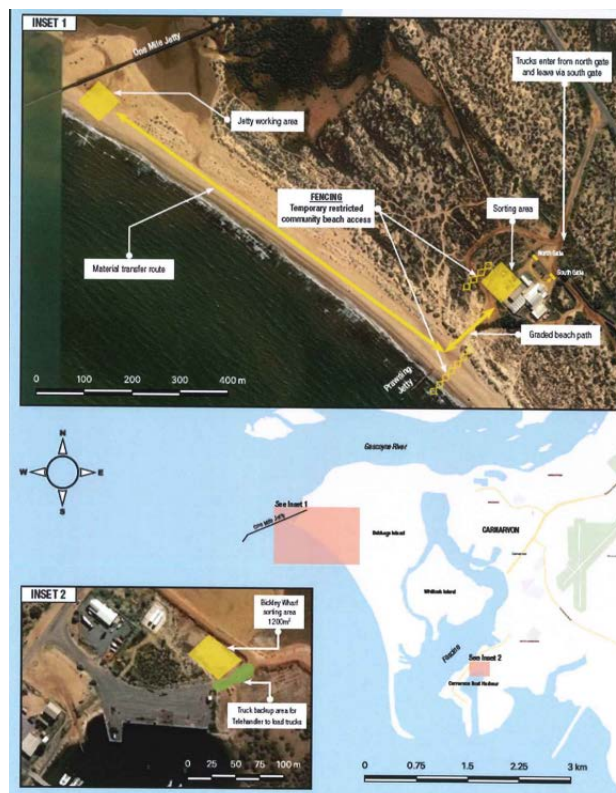

TEMPORARY BEACH CLOSURE FROM PRAWNING JETTY TO ONE MILE JETTY TO TAKE EFFECT FROM 11 OCTOBER 2021

The Shire has received an application from the Coastal Facilities Management – Maritime section of the Department of Transport seeking temporary closure of beach access between the Prawning Jetty and the One Mile Jetty for approximately 3 months commencing 11 October 2021.

Deconstruction works on the One Mile Jetty will be undertaken to address navigational safety hazards following Cyclone Seroja in February this year. Temporary closure is required on the grounds of safety to separate the public from operational works and moving machinery along this section of beach.

Cyclone Seroja caused damage to the One Mile Jetty in February of this year. Since then, remnant parts of the jetty have caused navigational hazards to commercial and recreational boats using the entry and exit channels into the Fascine and other moorings. The Coastal Facilities Management (Marine) section of Department of Transport's proposed partial deconstruction of the One Mile Jetty will improve safety for all marine craft navigating designated channels in and out of Carnarvon's waterways.



LOCAL ROADS AND COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

Council has agreed to two budget variations to allow an upgrade of the Baston Pavilion and replace the gazebo and bbq facility at the southern end of the Fascine.

Baston Pavilion is utilised primarily by the Carnarvon Soccer Club. Soccer has a strong and increasing following in the community, in particular, with juniors.

The report suggested an upgrade to the tramway bridge shelter however after lengthy discussion, Council was of the view that the Tramway Bridge shelter is a lesser priority and therefore removed construction expenditure to allow for funding of \$28,000 to be reallocated to the Fascine Shelter and BBQ which is the higher priority. However, in recognition that the current Tramway Bridge shelter has badly deteriorated, Council allocated funds of \$20,000 for it to be demolished and tidied up ready for a new structure when funds become available in future.

LEGAL ADVICE TO BE SOUGHT TO RECOVER OUTSTANDING DEBT AS A RESULT OF NON PAYMENT OF RATES

Council has received a request to waive the rates debt until such time as the property had been sold. The owner of A3508 purchased the property on the 26 of June 2013, under mortgage, and have received rates notices since that date. Rates have been paid in an ad hoc manner with substantial rates arrears always on the assessment. The last rates payment was made on 31 October 2016. As is normal practice when Rates become more than 3 years overdue the property becomes eligible for sale by Council under the Local Government Act 1995 (Section 6.64) to recover the debt.

A letter of demand was sent to the owner on the 20 November 2020 with no response. The debt on the property continues to increase with outstanding Legal fees to be received and daily interest.

The request was based on a number of reasons including but not limited to the fact that no attempt has been made to pay the rates since October 2016, all ratepayers need to pay rates so costs are equitably shared across the community, and debt collection measures since 2016 have not resolved the issue and have been largely ignored by the owner.

The Shire of Carnarvon (SoC) is committed to working collaboratively with others to ensure young people are valued, empowered, and supported to reach their full potential and are connected to community. Young people have unique perspectives, aspirations and needs. In order for them to reach their full potential the approach must be targeted to different ages and stages of development.

Over the past three months, the Shire has undertaken community consultation, research, and analysis to assess the extent to which the current youth services model and facilities meet the needs of young people and community; this research will ensure that Youth Services offer inclusive services to all young people.

The development of the Youth Strategy was informed by extensive consultation and research approach.

The approach involved research through a literature review of youth related issues, concerns and strategies across Australian local governments and youth organisation surveys, and the collection of relevant statistical and demographic information informed Strategy direction over eight months.

Analysis of the data was undertaken through coding—identifying and ranking the frequency and percentage of categories and themes that informed the outcomes and strategies.

Facts About Your Rates



How a boom can affect rates

During a boom, Councils increase employee wages to retain staff in a competitive jobs market, increasing budget requirements, which is to be recovered through rates.



How other charges affect rates

Services Councils pay for, such as street lighting, are often subject to price increases. These costs are passed on to councils which increases budget requirements, which in turn increases rates.



Home improvements can affect rates

If the comparative value of your home increases through renovations or an extension, the share of Council budget you pay in rates may increase.



Housing market movements do not affect rates

General changes in the Western Australian housing market have no impact on your comparative share of rates, due to all properties being affected.



Property rental values are independently set

The State's Valuer General sets values used to calculate individual rates according to the Gross Rental Value (GRV) a property could raise if rented. In many country areas, unimproved values (UV) are used according to land value.



How new Council projects affect rates

Councils strive to meet community requests for new facilities such as recreation centres, increasing Council budget requirements, which will be recovered through rates.



How costs of services affect rates

Did you know your rates may also pay for Council security vehicles, seniors programs, disability access and inclusion programs, rangers, community events, waste services and health inspections?



How community facilities affect rates

The local community determines priorities for services and facilities, which impact upon Council budget requirements, which in turn, increases rates.

- Gross Rental Value – Residential Housing, Special Use Rural Lots, Commercial Lots that have been developed;
- Unimproved Value – Undeveloped lots, Horticultural Lots, Pastoral Land;

All Land is valued by the Valuer General – objections to the value of your property can be lodged with the Valuer General through their Website.

Calculating the Rates Levied on the Property

Property Value multiplied by Rate in the Dollar

➤ Property Rental Value \$400 per week = \$20,800pa
➤ \$20,800 x 11.12 cents = \$2,312.96

➤ Property Value \$180 per week = \$9,360
➤ \$9,360 x 11.12 cents = \$1,040 (minimum rate of \$1158.58 will be levied)

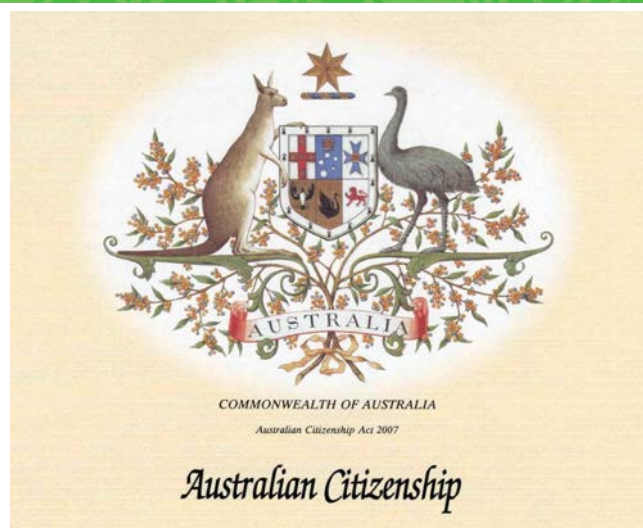

SO YOU WANT TO BECOME AN AUSTRALIAN CITIZEN?



The Shire of Carnarvon coordinates Australian Citizenship Ceremonies for approved applicants who live within the Shire.

Ceremonies are held at the Shire's Council Chambers on a regular basis, with a special Ceremony held on Australia Day each year.

The Citizenship Ceremony is a solemn act of law, through which you take on a new status and adopt Australia as your home. As Australians you will be members of a community which is democratic and which everyone has an equal right to life, liberty and freedom of opportunity and by becoming Australian Citizens you are showing that you want to belong and that you want to have a say in Australia's future.

What you Need to Do?

You will need to apply through the Department of Home Affairs with the following steps to be taken -

Step 1 - Check your eligibility

These details can be found on the Department of Home Affairs Website.

Step 2 - Prepare your Documents

You will need the following documents to provide evidence that you meet the Department's requirements -

- original police certificates
- scans of your original documents if you are applying online
- certified copies of all other documents if you have to lodge a paper application
- as much information as possible to help the Department decide your application
- each document only once, even if you are using it to show more than one thing
- all documents with your application if you can

Step 3 - Apply for Citizenship

You can apply online or on paper - see the Department of Home Affairs website

Step 4 - Come to your Appointment - this will be arranged through the Department of Home Affairs

Most people aged between 18 and 59 years will have an interview with the Department, and sit the citizenship test. Others might only have an interview with the Department. You will be sent an appointment letter with details. The time from when you apply to your appointment date varies, but can take several months.

Step 5 - Wait for the Department's decision

Step 6 - Wait for the Outcome

The Department will notify you in writing.

Step 7 - Attend a Citizenship Ceremony

The Shire of Carnarvon will send you an invitation to attend a ceremony when your approved Citizenship has been received.

FIREBREAK REQUIREMENTS

As a measure to assist in the control of bush fires or prevent the spread or extension of a bush fire, all owners and occupiers of land within the Shire of Carnarvon are required before the 1st day of October in each year (or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier of land if after that date) to clear firebreaks and maintain them up to and including the 30th day of April the following year.

1) TOWNSITE LAND - Refers to all land within the townsite

a) Where the land is 2,000 square meters or less:

- Maintain all dry grass on the land to a height no greater than 50mm
- Ensure no tree crowns overhang buildings
- Prune trees and shrubs and remove dead flammable material within 1.5m around all buildings
- Ensure the roofs, gutters and walls of all buildings on the land are free of flammable matter.

b) Where the land is greater than 2,000 square meters:

- Install a trafficable firebreak 3m wide and 4m high around all structures and within 2m of all external boundaries of the land
- Keep a 20m low fuel asset protection zone, clear of all flammable material, around all buildings.

2) RURAL, PASTORAL AND PLANTATION LAND - Refers to all land outside the townsite.

- A minimum width of 3m trafficable firebreak is required to be installed immediately inside or within 2m of the external boundaries of the land and kept clear of all flammable material.
- Around buildings, a 20m "parkland cleared less than 50mm" low fuel, asset protection zone clear of all flammable material is required.

PETS AND PARASITES



CATS

Monitoring your cat for any changes in its behavior, appetite, and water consumption and regular visits to your veterinarian are necessary to maintaining the well-being of your cat. Your veterinarian is there to diagnose, treat, and prevent parasites, such as fleas and worms, that not only affect your cat, but the health of you and your family. It is relatively common for a cat to become infected with an internal or external parasite at some point in its lifetime. Parasites can affect your cat in a variety of ways, ranging from a simple irritation to causing life-threatening illnesses if left untreated. All parasites, particularly internal parasites (worms), can carry and transmit diseases to people. By following your veterinarian's recommendations and having your pet tested for parasites annually, you can protect your cat and your family from these potentially harmful parasites all year long.

Parasite Control Recommendations for Cats

The use of year-round heartworm and broad-spectrum parasite medications, as well as appropriate flea and/or tick products, is the foundation of an effective parasite control program for your cat. In addition, the following steps can be part of a proactive program to help keep your cat healthy and parasite-free -

- Have your cat examined at least annually by your veterinarian and include a complete history.
- Have heartworm tests conducted periodically.
- Provide pets cooked or prepared food (not raw meat) and fresh, potable water.
- Conduct fecal examinations 2 to 4 times during the first year of life and 1 to 2 times each year for adults, depending on the pet's health and lifestyle factors.
- Administer anthelmintic treatment to puppies and kittens starting at two weeks of age repeating every two weeks until 8 weeks of age, followed by monthly treatments as a preventive.
- Also deworm nursing mothers along with their kittens.

DOGS

Dogs are not just pets. They are treated like members of the family. And like any member of your family, it's important to keep your companion animal healthy and free of parasites.

Monitoring for any changes in behavior, appetite, or water consumption and regular visits to your veterinarian are important to the care and well-being of your dog. Your veterinarian can accurately diagnose and safely treat parasites and other health problems that not only affect your dog, but also the safety of you and your family. It is fairly common for a dog to become infected with an internal or external parasite at some point in its lifetime.

Parasites can affect your dog in a variety of ways, ranging from simple irritation to causing life-threatening conditions if left untreated. Some parasites can infect and transmit diseases to people. By following your veterinarian's recommendations and having your pet tested for parasites annually, you can protect your dog and your family from potentially harmful parasites all year long.

HEALTHY PETS, HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

Feed pets commercial or cooked food (not raw diets) and provide fresh water.

Cover sandboxes when not in use, and protect garden areas from fecal contamination.

Pick up feces immediately when walking a dog in a public area and from the yard on a daily basis.

To prevent roaming and limit predation, keep dogs on a leash or behind a fence and keep cats indoors.

Permanently identify dogs and cats through microchip implantation.

Do not handle animal feces or urine with bare hands, and wash hands immediately after incidental contact. This recommendation is particularly important for children and individuals at increased risk.

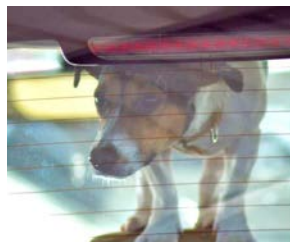


PETS IN VEHICLES

Did you know that every year, hundreds of pets die from heat exhaustion because they are left in parked vehicles. There are many excuses as to why animals are left in cars from *"Oh, it will just be a few minutes while I go into the shop"* or *"but I wound down the windows enough so that fresh air could get into the vehicle"*.

Data attained by local Australian motoring clubs shows that the ambient temperature inside a sealed car on a sunny 20-degree Celsius day can double in less than ten minutes, and rise to as much as 60 degrees C within 30 minutes. If the temperatures are hotter, then the interior temperatures rise accordingly. Even on a sunny 15-degree C day, internal temperatures can reach dangerous levels. Even night temperatures can be too much if it's a hot night. As well, studies have shown that even cracking the windows open to cool the car is essentially ineffective, as temperatures will still quickly rise to 80 per cent of the maximum potential top temp.

Please be diligent and before putting your pet in the vehicle ask yourself if you really need to take your pet with you - and if the answer is no leave your pet safely at home out of the heat.



HOW MANY DOGS CAN ONE PROPERTY HAVE?

The Shire of Carnarvon has limited the number of dogs to 2 dogs per property.

Requests for exemptions can only be approved by Council and the maximum limit you may apply for is 6 dogs per property. An application form can be obtained from the Shire office, costs \$150 and must go to Council for approval.

It is only for the dogs listed in the application and any breaches against the Dog Act or Dog Local law can result in the application being revoked. If you would like to apply to keep 3 to 6 dogs, or you have concerns with a neighbour who has a large number of dogs, please contact the Carnarvon Rangers on 9941 0019.

THINKING OF RE-HOMING A DOG?

All unclaimed rehomingable dogs that have been impounded are assessed and rehomed through SAFE Carnarvon. They are always looking for foster carers as their resources are limited. If you would like more information, please contact SAFE on 0448 569 563.

SAFE (Saving Animals From Euthanasia)

Their mission is to save companion animals from unnecessary euthanasia through community education, fostering, de-sexing and placing them in suitable homes.

SAFE has set up a network of temporary carers who open their homes to abandoned animals whilst permanent homes are sought. SAFE is proactive in helping to bring about positive change in the areas which cause so many unwanted, abandoned and neglected animals, and strongly supports and promotes desexing. Through positive change, the primary goal for SAFE is to make a difference in the quality of life for companion animals and to promote their immense value to humans.

IF YOU HAVE A NEIGHBOUR WITH A BARKING DOG

Speak to your neighbour or leave a note. They may not know their dog is a nuisance. If the barking continues, you can contact the Rangers. It can take some time to stop the barking, but if it continues, bark diaries may need to be completed to give a better indication of the problem times. If the matter is not resolved, diaries will need to be completed by three people from two different properties and the matter may be taken to court.

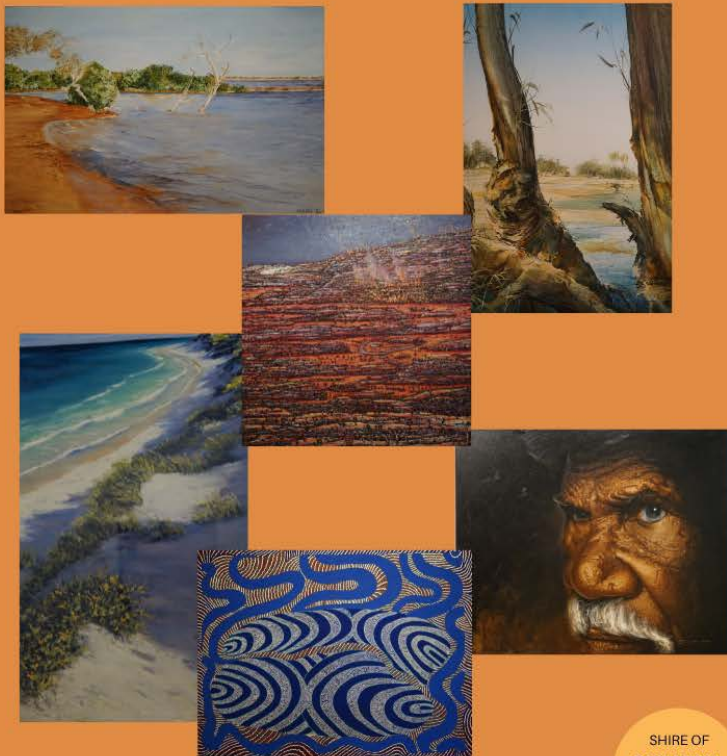

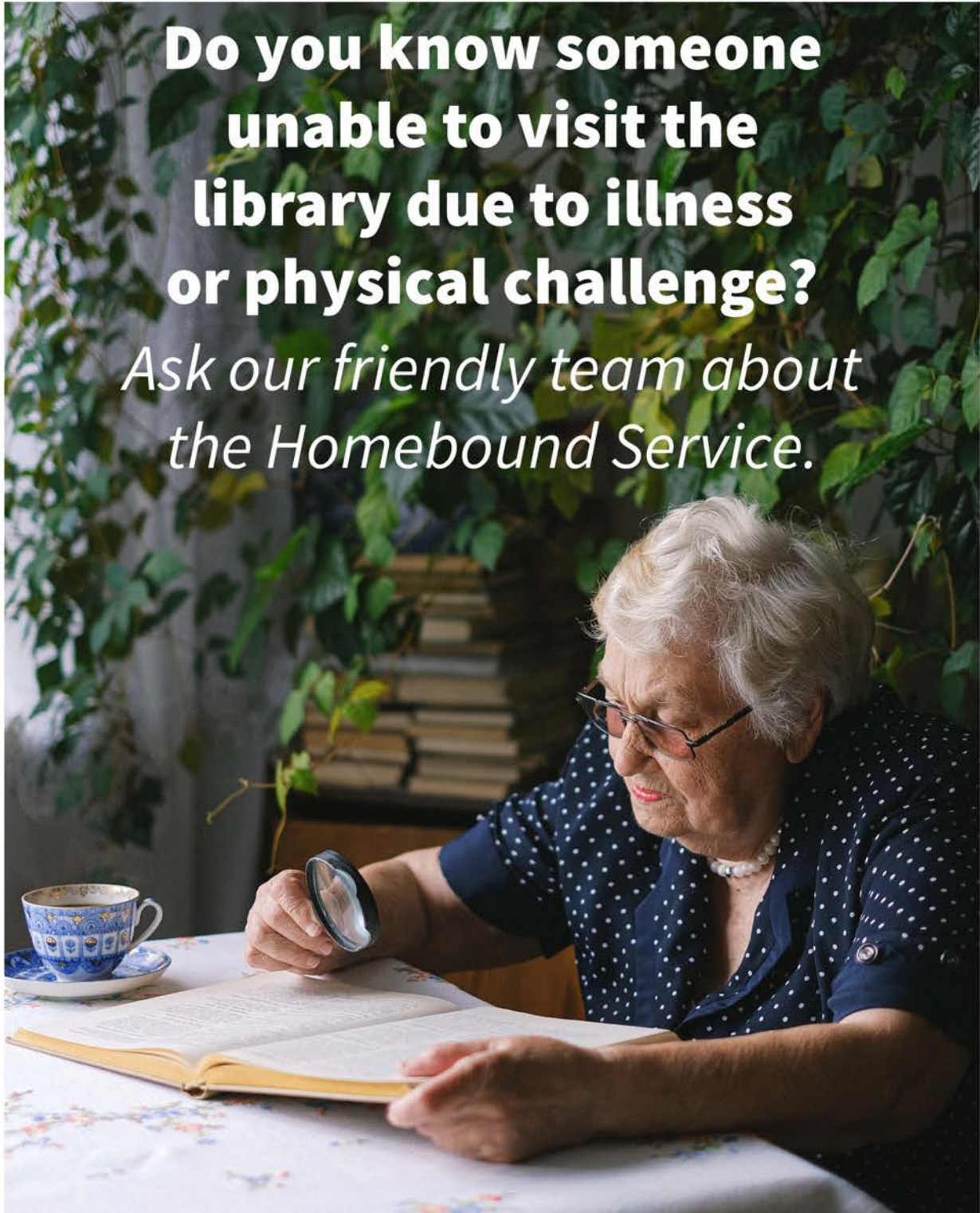

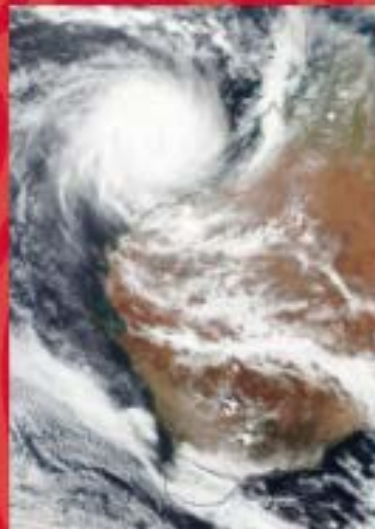

CYCLONE – BE PREPARED!

- On average five cyclones occur off Western Australia's (WA) north-west coast each year, of these, two directly impact the coast and affect local communities. In Western Australia (WA) cyclone season starts in November and continues through to April. During this time coastal regions of WA are at risk of being impacted by cyclones.
- Preparing your family and your property for a cyclone is your responsibility, this includes being familiar with the meanings of cyclone alerts and warnings. People also need to take proper precautions and responsibility for their own welfare, prepare property inside and out and develop a cyclone plan to ensure their safety.
- Planning before the cyclone season can help save lives, minimise property damage and help your family to cope during a cyclone.
- Experiencing a cyclone can be frightening and traumatic. After a cyclone, many essential services may not be working, roads may be closed, food and water could be in short supply and your property or livelihood could be damaged.
- The strong winds produced by a cyclone (up to 280 kilometres per hour) can cause injury, loss of life, major structural damage to communities, disruption of utility and telecommunication services, and turn debris into dangerous missiles.
- Cyclone activity produces strong onshore winds and flooding rains increasing the threat of storm surge. This is a rapid rise in sea level that accompanies a cyclone as it moves ashore.
- People can drown or be fatally injured during or after a cyclone by collapsing buildings and moving debris during severe winds.
- Having an emergency kit is an important step to prepare and protect your household for unforeseen events and is essential for short term survival providing vital items for you, your family or household. It is a good idea to always keep your kit in a handy place known to everyone in the household.
- Cyclone Olwyn was the most significant cyclone to affect the Gascoyne coast in decades. Olwyn impacted Carnarvon on the 13th March 2015, causing minor to moderate damage to homes and infrastructure, significant damage to the power network, disruptions to water supply and significant damages to plantations and cropping.

CYCLONE SEASON IS HERE!

Carnarvon is in a Cyclone area.

It is important that every household and business be in a state of readiness in case of impact. There are some simple things you can do to ensure the safety of your life and the life of others as well as your pets and home.

BLUE ALERT- Get ready for a cyclone

When a blue alert is issued, you need to get ready to put your plan into place.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Keep up to date with the latest on the cyclone through radio, television and online.
- Remind everyone in the household of the cyclone plan they committed to.
- Locate your emergency kit (and if you're planning to relocate, add the additional items).
- Secure items such as boats, caravans, trailers, garden sheds, rainwater tanks, outdoor furniture, loose material and rubbish around your home and work.
- Check in with friends and neighbours to make sure they are getting prepared to.

YELLOW ALERT- Act now to stay safe

If you don't take action now, the safety of you and your family are at risk.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Keep up to date with the latest on the cyclone through radio, television and online – Particularly storm surge advice.
- Put your plan in place. Go to your nearest welfare centre if you have planned to.
- Put fuel in your vehicle and park it in a sheltered area with the handbrake on and in park or first gear.
- Fasten all cyclone screens, board up or heavily tape exposed windows. Close your curtains and lock your doors.
- If you live in a low-lying area and the cyclone will create a storm surge, you may be advised to relocate now.

RED ALERT- Shelter now

You need to take shelter immediately. It's too late to be getting prepared now.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Keep listening to your portable radio for information on the cyclone's progress, don't rely on your mobile phone.
- Check that your pets are safely sheltered.
- Turn off your electrical and gas supply valves.
- Go immediately to the place where you planned to shelter in your home.
- Stay inside until the ALL CLEAR is given.

ALL CLEAR- Be Careful

When an ALL CLEAR is given it means the cyclone has passed, but you must be aware of hazards that may have been caused by the cyclone.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Check that your family and pets are safe and well.
- Listen to the radio and follow advice from authorities.
- Always wear shoes if you need to go outside. Be careful of fallen powerlines and trees, damaged water and sewerage lines, loose roof sheeting and other materials.
- Keep electrical appliances off until checked by a qualified tradesperson, and never use matches, cigarette lighters or naked flames as there may be a gas leak.
- If your property has sustained serious damage and you need help, call the SES on 132 500 for assistance. For life threatening emergencies, call 000.

The Yangibana Project

PROJECT UPDATE 2
October 2021

HASTINGS TECHNOLOGY METALS

The Yangibana Project is a significant Australian rare earth project, containing substantial Neodymium and Praseodymium (NdPr) resources. The Project covers 650 square kms in Western Australia's Upper Gascoyne region and is approximately 250 kms northeast of Carnarvon or 400 kms by road.

The Yangibana Project is being developed by Hastings Technology Metals Ltd. (ASX: HAS), an Australian rare earths mining company.

The Project will involve conventional open pit mining activities including drilling, blasting, loading and hauling the Rare Earth (RE) ore.

The RE ore will be crushed, milled and processed at the mine site beneficiation plant into a RE concentrate.

The concentrate will be hauled approximately 450 kms to a proposed Hydrometallurgical plant in the Pilbara for further processing to a Mixed Rare Earth Carbonate (MREC) product and shipped to global customers.

BENEFITS

With a life of mine of 15 years, the Yangibana Project promises significant benefits.

Hastings is committed to local supply chains and local content with an emphasis on enticing people to live and work in the region.

Jobs, contracts and training will be provided to local entities including Traditional Owners over the mine life.

Government royalties and taxes over the Project life are estimated at over \$335M, comprising \$277M in corporate and income tax; and \$60M in State Mineral Royalty.

STATUS

Hastings has recently established a construction execution team. Groundworks and early infrastructure programs (access roads, communications and camp) have commenced at Yangibana.

In parallel, Hastings is preparing permits and contracts for the proposed Hydrometallurgical plant; and, endeavouring to secure the required debt financing for Project construction through a consortium including NAIF (Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility) and KfW IpeX-Bank (German State Bank).



NEXT STEPS

Whilst Hastings has made steady progress toward the construction of the Yangibana Project, there remain a number of steps ahead of construction kick-off including:

- Finalisation of debt financing including NAIF support
- Finalisation of environmental permitting and all required approvals
- Final Investment Decision by the Hastings Board of Directors

Hastings is focussed on bringing the Project into production in 2024.

NdPr is a valuable product and a vital component in the manufacture of permanent magnets and electric generators that are used in goods ranging from electric vehicles, E-bikes, E-Scooters, drones, wind turbines and robotic solutions.

These applications are collectively referred to as **electric mobility** and renewables.

HAVE YOU SEEN THIS PLANT COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE GOLDEN CROWNBEARD?

(*Verbesina encelioides*)

Golden Crownbeard is a weed native to America. The species is now abundant around Geraldton and has been discovered in Carnarvon.

This plant is toxic and poses a threat to animals that eat the plant. Through exuding chemicals from its roots, golden crownbeard is also able to displace native vegetation and prevent native species from re-establishing following disturbance. To avoid damage to agriculture and the environment, the further spread of the species needs to be prevented.

If you see any of these plants in your area please contact the Shire of Carnarvon - email shire@carnarvon.wa.gov.au - a photo of the plant and where it's located is requested.



Prevention of further spread of this noxious weed is achievable if current infestations are controlled and new outbreaks attacked.

The distribution of golden crownbeard is limited so we can make a difference.

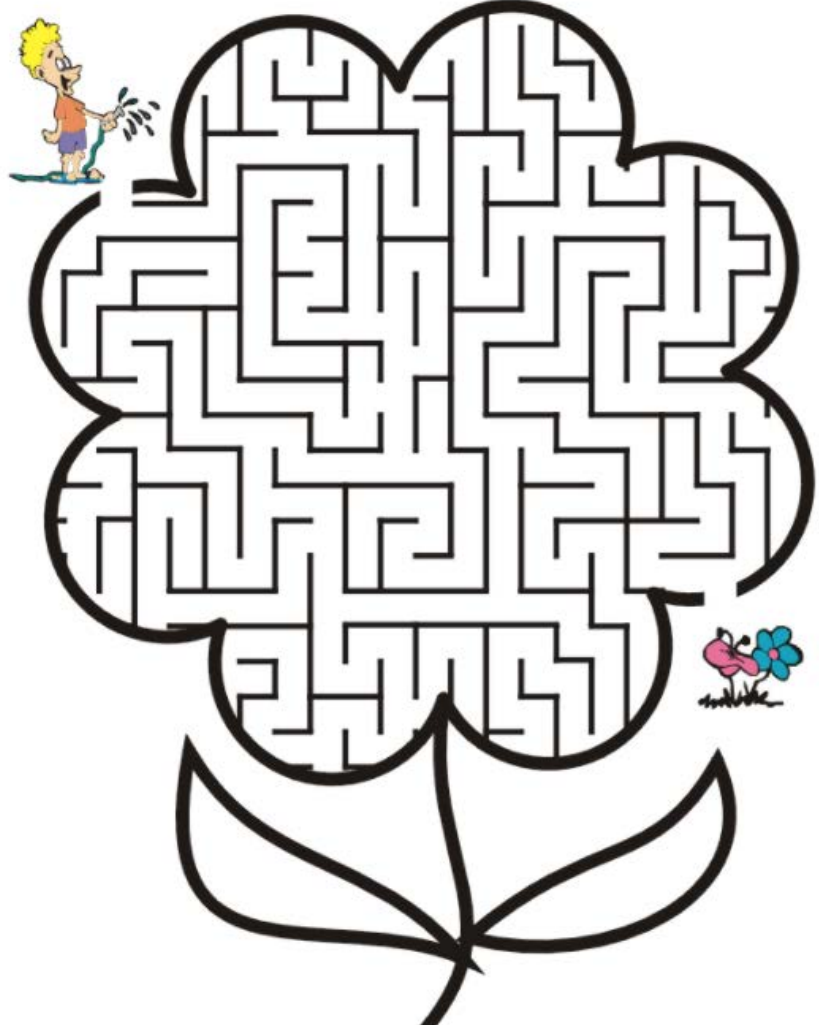

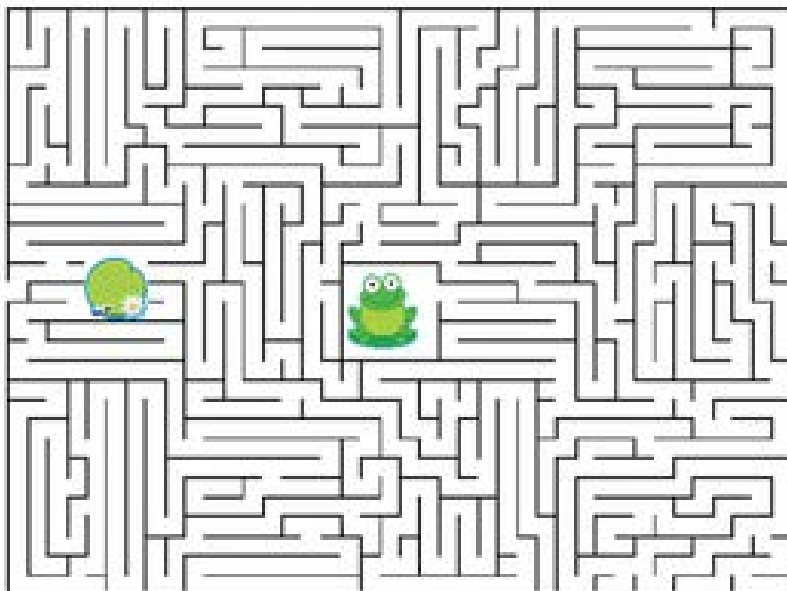
