From the Council Meeting

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BLOWHOLES ROAD WIDENING WORKS TO BE RETENDERED

The Shire of Carnarvon sought an experienced civil contractor for the provision of high standard cost-effective shoulder widening and sealed edge repair of Blowholes Road, Carnarvon. Public tenders were invited for the works.

Blowholes Road is a spray sealed road running generally northwest for approximately 50km from its intersection with the North West Coastal Highway to the Indian Ocean coast at Point Quobba. Caravans, motor homes and trailer boats are an increasing proportion of traffic on Blowholes Road.

Works are required to improve the level of service and safety for these and all other road users by:

- Increasing the overall width standard of the road to not less than 7 metres; and
- b) repairing the existing sealed edges.

Existing sealed widths along the road vary typically from 6.2 metres to 6.5 metres. Scalloped edge breaks and edge drop offs are present on sections of the existing sealed road edge. Edge failure repair will be completed in combination with the sealed width widening works.

Thirty-two kilometres of widening and edge repair was successfully completed in 2020 by RJ Haulage Pty Ltd (trading as Safe Roads WA).

Council did not accept either of the tender submissions as they were not compliant with requirements. I

As neither of the tenders received did not meet the tender requirements, Council resolved that the works be retendered.



DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL GRANTED TO NINGALOO CORAL BAY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF 20 NEW SERVICED VILLAS

Council received and approved an Application for Development Approval on Lot 1 (No. 44) Robinson Street, Coral Bay otherwise known as Ningaloo Coral Bay. The applicant was seeking approval for the redevelopment of the existing Bayview Villas by constructing 20 new serviced villas comprising of 16 two-bedroom villas and 4 three-bedroom villas. Each villa will provide its own associated car parking space(s).

Ningaloo Coral Bay is a substantive resort providing a range of tourist accommodation in Coral Bay. The landowner has undertaken an ongoing program of improvements to accommodation and facilities over the past decades and continues this program with this proposal to construct and use 20 serviced villas containing 64 beds for tourist accommodation. A total of 9 villas containing 54 beds will be removed to make room for the new development.

The proposed redevelopment of part of the Ningaloo Coral Bay resort entails the removal of the existing single storey villas and the development of 20 new double storey villas. The new villas will provide for an enhanced visitor stay experience and improved amenity as the new villas will be modern with excellent views over the beach.




Figure 1. Site plan

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GASCOYNE RIVER BUSHFIRE BRIGADE AND CARNARVON VOLUNTEER FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE TO CO-LOCATE

Council has supported the request for for co-location of the Gascoyne River Bushfire Brigade (BFB) and the Carnarvon Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service (VFRS) at the one facility, that being 344 Robinson Road Carnarvon (current VFRS station).

The Department of Fire and Emergency Services is currently in the process of planning for an extension to the current Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service station located at 344 Robinson Street Carnarvon to house the newly commissioned Road Crash Rescue (RCR) Tender

The original GRBFB fire station was built in 1974, adjacent the nine-mile bridge. In 1991 the existing appliance storage shed was built to facilitate the storage of larger vehicles, with the original building being converted into a meeting/training room and a donated portable ablutions block being installed later.

TENDER AWARDED FOR SUPPLY AND DELIVERY OF NEW WATER TRUCK

At the March 2021 Ordinary Meeting, Council approved a budget amendment to allow for the purchase of a new water truck.

Specifications for the water trucks was prepared and quotations requested utilising the WA Local Government Association's preferred supplier arrangements. In addition to utilisation of that program, officers utilised the WALGA eQuotes system for conducting the request for quotation. The eQuotes system allows a hands-off, transparent quotation process to be undertaken functioning with a similar degree of rigour as a tender process.

The tender was awarded to Major Motors Pty Ltd for the purchase of a Isuzu Water Truck.;

POLICY AMENDED TO THE APPOINTMENT OF ACTING CEO AND TEMPORARY CEO

Council had previously adopted a policy for the appointment of an acting CEO. However, legislation was amended in July 2019 adding a requirement to also have a policy on the temporary employment of a CEO. In response, an updated policy to encompass the employment of an acting CEO and a temporary CEO was prepared and endorsed by Council.

ORGANISATIONAL RESTRUCTURE REVISITED

The Shire of Carnarvon's Organisation Structure has been evaluated and updated to reflect the current needs of the Shire and ensure that the Shire has the capacity to deliver the services outlined in the Corporate Business Plan (CBP).

This review has taken place and the findings outlined in the Council Report.

In 2020 the CEO at the time engaged an external consultant to review and implement changes to the Organisational Structure and that a follow-up review to assess the impact, efficiency and effectiveness of the restructure be carried out.

In April 2021 a new CEO commenced and there were changes to staffing at an Executive level. Due to these changes, a potential risk to service delivery from unfilled vacancies and possible capacity in other parts of the organisation, a review into the structure was requested by the CEO. The objectives of the review were to:

- 1.Identify any gaps in the staffing levels that could pose a risk to critical service delivery.
- 2.To Identify any possible capacity or over-resourcing in the organisation.
- 3.To redistribute over-resourcing to areas of critical need.
- 4.To ensure the Shire is capable of delivering the services that are currently outlined in the Shire's CBP.
- 5.To get input and buy in from all levels of the organisation for the structure.
- 6.To finalise the draft structure in the context of the budget.
- 7.To present the draft structure to the Council for formal consideration as required by legislation.

Risks were identified and a full list can be seen in the Council Agenda Report available on Council's website.

Wages and salaries were frozen in the 2020/21 year. Therefore, there were no increases to salaries for that period. The Federal Government announced an increase of 2.5% to the minimum wage to take effect as of 1 July 2021. Noting the two above factors, the budget has been premised on a 3% increase to all employees excluding the CEO, Executive Managers and any person who receives a variation (and additional remuneration) to their contract in recognition of additional duties.

Council endorsed the proposed organisational structure as presented.

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COUNCIL TO PUT ON HOLD THE WAIVING OF TIP FEES FOR PLASTIC WASTE FROM RIVER AND GULLIES

Council considered a request for waiving of waste disposal fees for waste collected under a river and gullies clean-up campaign being coordinated by Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER). The Shire is a partner in this project it was requested that it be supported as the Shire's contribution to this campaign.

The flood event in early February 2021 that impacted Carnarvon, brought the management of waste materials from some areas in the Horticultural district to the attention of DWER, the Shire and other government agencies.

The Shire has participated in a working group consisting of DWER, DPIRD, Keep Australia Beautiful Council and the Carnarvon Growers Association to consider this issue and to find options to improve waste management practices in this local industry. To provide a more rigorous and quantified assessment of the scale and nature of the problem, DWER is funding a Waste Audit which is scheduled to occur on 24 – 27 August 2021.

Following the audit, the intent is to run an education and awareness raising campaign which will be followed by a 'clean-up campaign" from October to December. To ensure long term behaviour change is achieved, a focus on compliance and enforcement post the campaigns is important. This focus is currently being considered by the working group.

As part of the Shire's contribution to this campaign, DWER requested that Council considers waiving waste disposal fees as an incentive. The Council's support for this proposal is based on the partnership approach to addressing the critical need to address a significant environmental issue that is impacting this community and that has the potential to impact on perceptions of the local horticultural industry. The waiving of the waste disposal fee was seen as a positive and meaningful contribution from the Council.

After careful consideration, Council agreed that in order for Council to get a better understanding of the level of resourcing required to ensure compliance, that the matter be deferred and considered at another date.



TENDER AWARDED FOR SUPPLY AND DELIVERY OF SIDE LOADER REFUSE TRUCK

At the March 2021 Ordinary Meeting, Council approved a budget amendment to allow for the purchase of a new refuse truck.

Specifications for the refuse truck was prepared and quotations requested utilising the WA Local Government Association's preferred supplier arrangements. In addition to utilisation of that program, officers utilised the WALGA eQuotes system for conducting the request for quotation. The eQuotes system allows a hands-off, transparent quotation process to be undertaken functioning with a similar degree of rigour as a tender process.

The side loader equipment was specified to be placed on an Isuzu truck. Volumetric waste capacity of the specified unit is less than the existing Shire rubbish trucks. The proposed compactor unit has a capacity of 18 cubic metres. Capacity of the existing trucks is 22 cubic metres.

This was a deliberate capacity specification. Lower volume means the waste compactor unit can be accommodated on a smaller 4 x 2 truck (4 wheels, 2 driven wheels). Rubbish trucks make many slow speed turns in their normal daily operation. This places wear on tyres and wear on bitumen surfaces particularly in cul de sacs. The lower number of turning wheels is expected to result in savings both in tyres and road wear.

Existing trucks typically empty loads three times each collection day. The lower volumetric capacity of the new truck may result in an addition emptying trip each day. The operational strategy will be to utilise the new rubbish truck for the collection service as much as possible. The second truck will be held in reserve for times where essential servicing and repairs of the new truck are required.

Council awarded the tender to Bucher Municipal Pty Ltd for a Bucher Gen 6 SL18m3 Side Loading Refuse Compactor mounted upon an Isuzu Dual Control truck.

COUNCIL TO APPOINT CONSULTANT TO DEVELOP KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS FOR THE CEO

It is a requirement of the Local Government Act 1995 that Council must review the performance of the CEO on an annual basis. In order for the performance review to be effective, there must be clear and mutually agreed upon key performance indicators (KPIs) upon which the performance of the CEO can be measured and evaluated.

Council has appointed Hammond Woodhouse Advisory to develop and facilitate KPI's for the CEO.

LOOK OUT!

I am sure that many people have come across people riding their bikes and skateboards on the footpaths in the main street and have had to step out of the way to avoid a collision.

Council are aware of the issue and the apparent disregard by these particular users of the footpath. Pedestrians, mobility scooters and wheelchairs have right of way on Council paths and with this in mind, Council will be banning the riding of bikes, skateboard, roller blading and scooter riding on the Robinson Street Footpaths between the first roundabout and the last roundabout. If you are caught riding on the footpaths, a \$25 fine will be imposed.

Visible signage is erected along the footpaths to ensure that users are aware of the rules.

FINES - Riding a bicycle on other than dual use footpath(\$25); Riding a bicycle on other than a left hand side of a footpath (\$25); Riding a bicycle on a footpath at a speed in excess of 15km/hr (\$25)

Rangers have been busy for the month of July as can be seen from the statistics.

The Shire of Carnarvon has 2 full time Rangers (based in Carnarvon); 1 part time Ranger (based in Carnarvon), and 1 part time Ranger (based in Coral Bay).

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

The Shire of Carnarvon employs two EHO's and have been busy conducting food business inspections during July. Water testing has been conducted at the Browns Range Waste Facility, the Fascine and jetty. Mosquito surveys have also recently been conducted in the swamps located at Babbage Island and One Tree Point.

ROADS UPDATE

A mid year verge side collection was conducted with 28 tones of green waste collected. The Gnaraloo Road grading has been completed and another opening grade on the Minilya/Lyndon Road was conducted. The Bibbawarra and Miaboolya Roads have been graded and the Airport taxiways swept. Trees that have overgrown onto powerlines have also been pruned by Council's contractor.

PARKS AND GARDENS UPDATE

It has been a busy month for the Parks and Gardens crew with the Butcher Street Playgroup grounds mowed and tidied. Town Oval was mowed in preparation for the fun fair which arrived 22 July. Mowing and weeding has continued in the Northwater area, and damaged reticulation has been repaired on Robinson Street.

The Shire currently has two school based trainees training in the Parks and Gardens Department.






YOUR REQUESTS/COMPLAINTS ANSWERED







Alternatively, these forms are available at the front counter of the Administration Building in Francis Street.

To note that since the inception of the new system the Shire has received a total of 71 requests and/or complaints, the majority of which have been answered within 1-7 working days with the more complex matters being followed up regularly until a satisfactory result has been achieved. Shown at right is an indication of the time frames for responses, subject of complaint/request and department referral for the period 3 June to 9 July 2021.

With the community's cooperation, we are able to log the request which gives us greater ability to track customer requests and improve our response.







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MOWING

The Shire has received numerous verge mowing requests over the last few months. This is the first time in multiple years where such consistent rainfall has caused this issue to be so significant.

Up until last year, the Shire was undertaking township verge mowing at least once or twice every year. That was an enormous strain on resources which we simply could not continue. This is especially the case when we have periods of sustained or frequent rain like recently. There may also be a perception in the community that the Shire has a large number of employees available for this sort of work. In reality our Parks and Gardens team has a total of seven personnel.

The Shire has begun to map all community public space areas that require mowing, excluding verges directly adjacent to properties. At last count the area was over 70 hectares and counting. To put that in perspective that is something like 40 Optus stadiums. The way grass is growing at the moment, mowing is required almost weekly so that is a massive task for just a handful of people.

Verges typically form part of the road reserve property. They are used for various purposes including footpaths, driveway crossovers and for services such as power, water and telecommunications.

Council is introducing a new Public Places and Local Government Property Local Law in the very near future. That local law includes verge maintenance responsibilities. The draft local laws can be found on Council's website at -

Regarding verges, the Local Law essentially says that if the owner of the adjoining property wants to have a lawn (or other "permissible verge treatment"), then it is their obligation and responsibility to maintain the verge in front of their residence.

It is not possible under the local law for the Shire to compel a resident/property owner to maintain their verge if they do not want to install and maintain a permissible verge treatment. We take a risk based approach to those non maintained areas. If the verge condition is impacting upon the safe use of the verge or road then the Shire may need to undertake action to remedy.

Road reserve care and control is ultimately a responsibility of the Local Government. However for a small local government such as ourselves, we simply do not have sufficient resources available to regularly mow and maintain all verges. This is where we count upon responsible community members such as yourself to assist and take pride in their own little patch.

We do appreciate that some verge areas contain drains or other public infrastructure that are difficult for the average resident to maintain. These are assessed on a case by case basis.





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RESIDENTIAL VERGE SIDE COLLECTION - ANOTHER GREAT SUCCESS AND WELL SUPPORTED BY THE COMMUNITY

From Friday 9th July to Thursday 15 July, the Shire of Carnarvon conducted its annual verge side collection. The community got stuck in and did some cleaning around their property and contributed over 28 tonnes of green waste and building waste. A very big thank you to those residents that took the opportunity clean up their yards making it safer for the community.

RURAL ROAD TRIP NUMBER 3

Both the CEO Andrea Selvey and the Executive Manager Infrastructure Services completed their 3rd rural road tour on Friday 16 July visiting Brickhouse, Doorawarrah, Meeragoolia and Yalbalgo Stations.

Recent rural road trips have also included Wandagee, Middalya, Williambury, Lymdona, Wooramel, Yaringa, Meedo, Wahroonga, Marron, Edaggee, Ella Valla and Callgaiddy Stations.

RURAL ROAD UPDATE

Maintenance grading on the Quobba/Gnaraloo Road has been completed and a temporary crossing constructed on the Minilya/Lyndo Road as a result of recent river flow. The crossing is now trafficable with caution.

RURAL ROAD NETWORK

The majority of Council's rural road network has been reopened with caution after further rain through the region. This year the Carnarvon Airport has recorded 370.2mm of rain, with greater amounts received across the Gascoyne. Unfortunately, road users are still using the roads after they have been closed. Visitors are reminded that under no circumstances are any closed roads to be driven on.

ROAD CLOSED

The Shire of Carnarvon are very disappointed by the number of people who are continuing to ignore the very obvious 'Road Closed" signs which are put on dirt roads for a specific reason - **THE ROAD IS NOT TO BE DRIVEN ON UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES.**

As a result of rainfall over the last few months, many rural roads have been closed to all traffic to avoid damage to the road which occurs when traffic travel on the road wet. Unfortunately, some travellers are ignoring the signs and traveling along the roads causing extensive damage.

Travellers are advised of dirt roads closed in the Carnarvon Shire by way of Facebook and on Council's website - it is also advertised on the local radio and people can ring the Shire Offices on 99410000 to find out if any roads are closed before they decide to travel. Did you know that if you are caught travelling on a closed road you can be fined. Also, some insurance companies may not cover you if you are involved in a collision while travelling on a closed road.

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KEEPING OF POULTRY - NON RURAL PROPERTIES

The following Guidelines apply to people who wish to keep poultry in the Shire of Carnarvon, other than on land zoned rural under Council's Town Planning Scheme 13. (Under the Shire of Carnarvon's Local Laws poultry includes chickens, peafowl, turkeys, geese and ducks.)

The Shire of Carnarvon's Local Laws require poultry to be kept in the following manner -

- No more than 12 birds may be kept unless the land is zoned Rural.
- Poultry must be kept in a properly constructed and securely fastened enclosure or structure.
- No poultry can be able to approach within 15m of a dwelling house, public building, place of employment or food premises
- Such that no poultry may approach within 18m of a street other than a right of way without Council approval.
- The yard which contains the poultry enclosure must be at least 30m2 in area.
- Roosters may not be kept without permission of the Principal Environmental Health Officer unless the land is zoned Rural.

Council's Health Services also suggests that residents keep their poultry or pigeons at least 1.2 metres from the property boundary.

Nuisances and Complaints

It is your responsibility to ensure the poultry are kept clean and free of vermin. Any complaints received regarding odour, dust, noise, flies or rats will be investigated by Council's Environmental Health Officers.

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MOSQUITOES

There is no cure or vaccine to protect against mosquito borne diseases acquired in Australia. The only way to prevent infection is to avoid being bitten. This can be done by -

- Covering up and wearing long, loose fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much body as you can.
- When outdoors and mosquitoes are present, apply insect repellent containing DEET (diethyltoluamide) or picaridin evenly to exposed skin.
- Clean up making simple changes around your home can reduce mosquito breeding. Remove, empty or cover water-holding containers.

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DOG ATTACK!

The Shire of Carnarvon encourages residents who are victims of a dog attack to report the matter immediately to the Shire of Carnarvon Rangers at rangers@carnarvon.wa.gov.au or 0408 942 945.

When reporting a dog attack please include a description of the dog, date, time and location. These details are imperative so that the Rangers can investigate further.

Your help in reporting these matters will enable the Rangers to monitor offending dogs to ascertain if they are a threat to the community and if so take the necessary action. Dog attack victims are urged to seek immediate medical attention to ensure that the wound/s do not become infected and to also determine if a tetanus shot is required. Not having a tetanus shot in five or more years increases tetanus risk and a booster shot may be recommended.

Here are some suggestions to help should you ever encounter an aggressive dog -

DOG OWNERS

- All dogs can be territorial. Most dog attacks in public occur on the footpath or road in front of the dog's property
- Confining dogs to their property could prevent 80% of dog attacks in public places.
- You can be fined if your dog isn't securely confined, or if it rushes at or attacks a person or animal
- Your dog is to be confined to your property allowing access to your front door.
- When in a public place, your dog must be kept on a lead at all times unless in an approved off leash area.
- While in an off leash area, you must have verbal control over your dog. If your dog does not obey verbal commands, it must be kept on a leash, even in off leash areas.

KNOW WHAT TO DO IF APPROACHED BY AN AGGRESSIVE DOG

- Stand still, don't run
- Keep your hands by your side
- Stay quiet, try not to make any noise
- Avoid eye contact with the dog, look at the ground
- Once the dog has lost interest, slowly back away

RESTRICTED BURNING SEASON IS OVER

The Shire of Carnarvon's restricted burning season came to an end on the 30th April 2021. As of the 1st May 2021, you no longer need a permit to burn, however you are still required to exercise caution, manage smoke nuisance and ensure there are no plastics, chemicals, rubber, tyres or other materials that create black smoke when being burnt. Burning these materials releases toxic chemicals into the environment and can result in a penalty of up to \$5,000.

If you are unsure of what you can burn, please give Rangers a call on 99410019 and they will be happy to give you some advice.



With winter coming, this is the perfect opportunity for owners to do some hazard reduction work on their properties. This can be achieved by:

- Mowing, slashing and removing long dry grass or vegetation.
- Raking or utilizing machinery to remove leaf litter and dead vegetation.
- Controlled burning is an effective way to reduce available ground fuel, however controlled burning requires considerable experience in order to be carried out safely.

If you are not comfortable in conducting a burn yourself or would like to burn a larger area on your property, the local Volunteer Fire Brigades can assist with your burns for a fee, subject to volunteer availability. Please note that this service is available on land that you own or rent only, and does not include areas adjoining your property, including road verges. All funds raised through conducting burns on private property go directly towards supporting your local volunteer fire brigades.

Engaging the brigades does not remove the landowners responsibility to adhere to the Firebreak Notice. Contact your local brigade for more information:

CARNARVON AGED CARE FACILITY HAS A NAME

(Media Statement 1 July 2021 - Hon Roger Cook, Minister for Health)

Carnarvon's \$19.1 million residential care facility will be named Gnullingoo Mia Residential Care, which means 'our home' in the local Inggarda language. As part of its commitment to developing health services that are culturally welcoming, WA Country Health Service consulted with the Bundiyarra-Irra Wangga Language Centre and senior Inggarda elders on an inclusive Inggarda name for the facility.

The name 'Gnullingoo Mia' (pronounced Null-ing-oo My-ah) comes from the Inggarda words 'Gnulli'; which means all of us, and 'Mia'; which is home, so the translation into English is; 'our home'.

Gnullingoo Mia Residential Care will be co-located at Carnarvon Hospital to enable integration with other health services. The 38-bed facility includes accommodation for couples and family members, and ensures local people feel at home while accessing culturally sensitive care in their local community. Gnullingoo Mia Residential Care is on track with practical completion expected in late 2021, enabling new residents to occupy the facility in early 2022.

DID YOU HEAR THE BUZZ? BURROWING BEES ARE BACK!

Carnarvon is one of the lucky places where the Dawson's Burrowing Bees feel at ease and have made their homes on Pelican Point Road and Black Flats. A native species of bee, unique to Western Australia's north-west, is leaving a distinct trail across the Gascoyne region, as hatchlings emerge from the ground.

Physical evidence of the Dawson's Burrowing Bee only occurs from July to September, when new bees hatch from underground burrows to mate. The females later tunnel into hard-baked clay pans to lay new eggs. The whole process leaves thousands of holes in the landscape and their burrows typically look like a drill hole in the ground. Inland they will typically be in clay pan flats and around urban areas, like in Carnarvon, you will typically see them on unsealed roads. All of the little drill holes will be perhaps 10 or 15 centimetres apart and there will be sometimes thousands of them in a relatively small area. The species is one of Australia's largest native bees and is predominantly found in the Gascoyne and lower part of the Pilbara. Caution needs to be taken when approaching the nests. Even though they are big and noisy, they are essentially harmless, but the experts say that if you do pick up a female bee, it will sting you. If you are just there observing their activity they won't be disturbed by that.

The insects have previously attracted the attention of wildlife enthusiast David Attenborough and the BBC Natural History unit, who filmed a documentary about their mating habits. The female emerges from the burrow in the ground and the males are all there ready and waiting for her, sometimes there might be 20 or so. They then all brawl over access to the female, often killing each other, and in some cases the female even is a casualty. The process is a "two-speed evolutionary outcome"." The strongest males will dominate around the burrow hole and the weakest males can still be in with a chance because they decide it's too competitive around the hole, and go to wait nearby in shrubs for the odd female that does escape the frenzied activity at the burrow entrance.

The bee generally does not produce honey They collect pollen and nectar from flowers and that's just for the purpose of when they lay the eggs in their drill hole tunnel. They deposit a bit of pollen and nectar in around the egg, so the egg can live off that when it hatches. It's a tiny amount and because they don't live in hives together there is nowhere near a commercial amount of honey available.

YANGIBANA RARE EARTHS PROJECT

PROJECT UPDATE 1, JULY 2021

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Yangibana Project is a significant Australian rare earth project, containing one of the highest known Neodymium and Praseodymium (NdPr) resources in the world. The Project covers 650 square kms in Western Australia's upper Gascoyne region and is approximately 250 kms by road northeast of Carnaryon.

The Yangibana Project is being developed by Hastings Technology Metals Ltd. (ASX: HAS), an Australian rare earths mining company.


Hastings' current Ore Reserve estimates has extended the Yangibana mine life to ~15 years. The Project will involve open pit, load and haul and drill and blast mining. The Rare Earth (RE) ore will be crushed, ground and processed at the mine site to a RE concentrate. The concentrate will be hauled to a proposed Hydromet plant in the Pilbara for further processing to a Mixed Rare Earth Carbonate (MREC) product. The MREC will be trucked to regional ports and shipped to its global customers.

WHAT ARE RARE EARTHS?

Rare Earth Elements (REE), also called rare-earth metals or rare-earth oxides, are a set of 17 metallic elements. Rare earth elements are essential enablers of Green energy and electric vehicle (EVs). NdPr is one of the most valuable products and a vital component in the manufacture of magnets and electric generators that are used in commodities ranging from electric vehicles, E-bikes, E-Scooters, drones, wind turbines, medical technology products and robotic solutions.

These applications are collectively referred to as "electric mobility and renewables".

YANGIBANA RARE EARTHS PROJECT

PROJECT UPDATE 1, JULY 2021

CURRENT STATUS*

In February 2021, Hastings raised A\$100M and as part of its construction plan, is now establishing an experienced mine execution team. The team includes external partners and a lending consortium for the Project debt.

Groundworks and early infrastructure programs are expected to commence in 3Q 2021 ahead of construction and then the first production in 2024. In parallel, Hastings is preparing all permits and contracts for its proposed Hydromet facility in the Pilbara.

- The base case mine site was fully permitted and shovel ready with amendments to permits underway for layout improvements.
- 2021 Hastings expects to announce an updated Reserve life of mine enabling the financial model to be revised. This underpins the finalisation of the debt facility and financing.
- Commencement of early works at Yangibana is scheduled to commence 3Q 2021.
- Project finance in progress for credit approval in 2021 and financial close in 2022 lead by strong government and export credit groups.



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
